If you have not had a chance to complete the survey yet, please note that the online surveys will remain open until Friday, 12 August 2022. The invitation was sent from the Department of Education, not the school, and had the subject line School Opinion Survey for parents and caregivers, 2022. 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

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Kindy, Prep and Year 1 News

There has been lots of fun and hands on learning happening in our room in weeks 2 and 3.



In maths we are beginning to learn about measurements, so we started with measuring some children by tracing around them on the concrete, then using a piece of string to measure it. When we got back into the classroom, we used the string to place stacking blocks next to, so we could see how long they were in blocks. Ariel was 158 blocks and Bobby was 162 blocks.

In science, we are exploring light and light sources – today that led us to looking into shadow puppets. We discussed what light source we could use and decided on the sun. We went out to the eating area and the students were able to explore what shapes they could make. The main theme was animals, however, Bobby and Varnya were able to

make a house together. Rylan and Ariel worked together to make a diplodocus! Check out the photos to see what a great job they did.

Our sounds for this week was 'oa', which is a long o sound. To help cement learning each sound, we like to do an activity. Often it is a craft activity, but this week we used these sounds to 'make a boat that can float'. The students split up into groups and made a boat that was supposed to float. Although there were some amazing looking boats, only 1 managed to stay afloat – well done Bronte!



In HASS we are looking at families and how they are all made up differently. During the next few weeks, we will be engaging families to help their students with creating a family tree.

What a great fortnight we have had.


The year 2 students have been working with great gusto on their English with Mrs Birch creating procedures. This means that they are doing some yummy cooking.





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Year 3, 4, 5 Co-constructed historical recount

Extract of text from The First Fleet by Alan Boardman

Seven weeks after leaving the Cape of Good Hope the advance party rounded Van Diemen's Land and on January 18th arrived at Botany Bay, a mere two days ahead of the rest of the fleet.

The land here appeared grim and inhospitable so, sailing even further north, Phillip discovered Port Jackson where the entire fleet anchored on January 26th, 1788. A landing party was sent ashore, and the British flag unfurled whilst the marines fired volleys into the air. Toasts were drunk to the health of the new colony.

Co-constructed historical recount

The seven-week journey was a hard slog. At last I saw Botany Bay. Unfortunately, the land here appeared grim and inhospitable. As the captain of the First Fleet I, Captain Arthur Phillip, decided that we would sail further north to find a more suitable place to put down anchor.

After one further week of sailing through calmer waters I discovered Port Jackson. It was January 26, 1788. The land here had green trees in abundance and some strange looking animals hopping around the countryside. This made me feel hopeful.

To further investigate I decided on my best marines and sent them ashore as the first landing party. As I watched worriedly through my telescope I saw the marines firing lots of volleys into the air. With relief I realised that it was a safe place to build the colony. The crew were all pleased to get off the ship after such a long journey.


